Forry is often asked by people in the industry to speak with young actors and writers hoping to break into the business. His advice is widely accepted by Hollywood insiders as invaluable.

These are his keys to making it in Hollywood.

INTRODUCTION

You're no doubt aware of the countless websites available to you on the subject of coming to Hollywood to pursue an acting career. What makes my book any different?

Mine is a personal journey through the lens of someone who's not only been there, but done that. It's littered with anecdotes that will not only educate you, but entertain you, as well. Whereas the websites give it to you in black and white, mine comes at you in living color.

Before we go any further, it's important to establish that I know what I'm talking about. I've guest-starred on dozens of television shows, had a two-year contract on a popular soap opera, and wrote a film for a huge movie star that was produced by a major studio. All with no professional training prior to coming to Hollywood.

Now, before you rack your brain trying to figure out who I am or who I played on television, I'll get right to the point.

In the early 90's, the daytime drama "Santa Barbara" was the critical darling of the soap opera world. Created in 1984, "S. B." won four daytime Emmys in the eight short years it was on the air. Loved by the media but largely ignored by daytime viewers, "S.B." was canceled in January, 1993... replaced by a mindless game show in a cost-cutting decision by NBC.

Like many of its soap opera counterparts, “S.B.” revolved around the relationship of two of its biggest stars. While “All My Children” featured the engaging love story of Greg and Jenny, and “General Hospital” banked on the twisted love affair of Luke and Laura, “S.B.” was no different... pairing together star-crossed lovers Cruz Castillo and Eden Capwell.

That’s where I come in.

In an attempt to broaden its audience, “S.B.” introduced a blue collar family that included Cruz’s best friend from high school... a character by the name of Reese Walker. Reese was returning to town after a twenty year absence. I played Reese Walker.

It was a terrific opportunity for me... **an opportunity that almost didn’t happen because of my ignorance about doing daytime television.**

If only I’d been better educated.

Throughout this book, I will give you the best advice available on how to break into Hollywood.

Advice that comes from a guy who arrived in Hollywood in a 1974 Ford Pinto and went on to write a film for one of the biggest movie stars in the world.

Now that I’ve introduced myself...
